



David Hartsilver, Carpentry Lecturer, commented: "This award was given to Andre for his eagerness to learn, always being on time and focused during his lessons, and also achieving 100% attendance and punctuality during the bus and train strikes."

During his studies, Andre has also secured two different work experience placements one with 'Pilgrim Harps' (Harp Manufacturer) and the second with the National Theatre, South Bank, London.

# WHAT HAVE ENGINEERING STUDENTS BEEN UP TO?



We recently popped into our Engineering Level 2 class at JRC to see what the students have been getting up to in the first term. Throughout the academic year, students complete eight units from Engineering Maintenance to Materials to Mathematics for Engineering.

In a recent lesson, students were learning about manufacturing processes and the equipment used. The students were given images of various manufacturing processes and had to write down the name of the manufacturing process based on the image shown and the brief explanation given to them. For every question a student answered correctly, they would receive £10, £20 or £50 (not real money!) depending on the complexity of the question.

The next activity was a Mission Impossible challenge where the students had to work in teams to extract information from around the classroom on the advantages and disadvantages of three different manufacturing methods.

During the challenge, students had to decipher codes using a range of equipment including a map, tape measure, magazine, photographs, Flags of the World book, tablets and a password-protected laptop.

## BRINGING AWARENESS TO COUNTY LINES INTENSIFICATION WEEK

As part of the ongoing work to tackle the threat of drug trafficking and knife crime across the country, both East Surrey College and John Ruskin College had key representatives join the staff to raise awareness as part of the County Lines Intensification Week.

On Friday 24 February, a knife arch was set up at the main student entrance at John Ruskin College along with a random bag search. Representatives from Croydon MET Police were onsite to speak with students about the roles of the Police and how students can play their part to keep the Croydon community safe.

On Wednesday 1 March at East Surrey College, students were welcomed by a signed van outside the College with key messaging about county lines. This provided students with information about the Fearless Youth service, which develops effective anti-crime resources for young people and their families.

Throughout the day, students could attend workshops and speak with representatives in our Winter Garden to find out how they can help support the local community by reporting any drug-related crime. Students were also able to meet Hector, the trainee puppy, giving them an insight into the role dogs play in the force.

Lindsay Pamphilon, CEO/Principal, commented on the activities: "Both East Surrey College and John Ruskin College have been delighted with the opportunity for students to hear more from the police about County Lines, talk to officers, and gain a first-hand understanding of the importance of keeping our community safe."

# TOP INTERVIEW TIPS FROM OUR CAREER ADVISORS

#### Number 1: Be your unique self

The interviewer has already seen your qualifications and skills at a glance via your application or CV, so make sure you're being your authentic self and let your personality shine through.

#### Number 2: Do your research

Make sure you do your research about the company you are applying for or the subject you plan to study. You know which role you're applying for, but do you know the company's goals, missions and values, and do they align with yours?

By doing your research, you will be more confident with your answers!

#### Number 3: Never leave an interview without asking a question

Remember that an interview should always work both ways. Yes, the company or university should find out more about you, but you also have the opportunity to find out if the employer is a perfect match for you. We recommend you ask around 3-5 questions.

#### Number 4: Use the STAR method

The STAR method is a great interview technique that will give you a straightforward format you can use to tell a story by discussing a specific situation, task, action and the result.

#### Number 5: Dress to Impress!

Dress for the occasion; wearing the right attire for an interview shows that you're serious about the job, respectful of the interviewer's time and genuinely interested in the role. It's important to make a good first impression.



# GET INVOLVED AT THE EMPLOYABILITY HUB!



Over the past year, John Ruskin College has worked in partnership with the Department for Work & Pensions and Jobcentre Plus Croydon to support unemployed

18–24 year olds with their search for work via mentoring, career information, advice and guidance, short courses and follow-up. During this time, over 200 people have engaged with the Hub via a session with a Careers Advisor which led to 122 enrolments onto short courses and over 40 progressions into paid work or full-time employment to date.

With Lisa's excellent GSCE grades, she could have taken A Levels but couldn't see a direction in studying three separate subjects.

She decided instead to come to ESC as it offered a T level in Childcare, which she felt was a more direct route to her chosen career.

"This T Level appealed as it allows me to focus on a single subject whilst achieving the equivalent of 3 A Levels. I also really like the work/ study balance of my timetable three days in College and two days



working in a nursery school in Horley."

One of Lisa's favourite aspects of the course is the balance between academic assignments and practical activities. She feels her work placement has had a very positive effect on her studies:

"Having a real-life application helps so much with coursework and gives a good insight into what work will be really like."

In the future, Lisa plans to specialise in Primary Teaching at University or become a teaching assistant in a school and learn on the job.
